Artemis House

At the luncheon, we will be accepting donations to Artemis House of store gift cards and personal care item donations for Artemis House, which is the <u>only</u> Fairfax County emergency shelter for women and children fleeing domestic and sexual violence and human trafficking. Donations are tax deductible.

The AAUW of Vienna store gift cards and personal care items are given to Artemis House families at the Artemis House holiday celebrations and are much appreciated. The cards from different stores can help them buy, for example:

- Groceries
- Clothing
- Children's toys and books
- Long-distance calls to family
- Occasional restaurant meals
- Automobile needs, including gasoline
- Pharmacy and personal care items

The personal care items should be regular-size adult, children's and baby products such as body wash, liquid hand soap, bar soap, body lotion, shampoo, hair conditioner and other hair products, toothbrush and toothpaste.

Our speaker is the Development Coordinator for Second Story, which was founded in 1972 as "Alternative House." Second Story transforms the lives of children and youth, helping them stay safe, make positive decisions, achieve educational success, and overcome personal crises. The Young Mothers program provides housing, counseling and training to homeless women age 16 to 24 who are pregnant or have young children.

Vienna AAUW is working with three other local AAUW branches, Fairfax County Public Schools and NOVA Systemic Solutions to present STEMtastics 2018.



Woodson is able to convey so much with so little—her words and sentences are beautifully crafted to fill you with emotion and understanding in a single line that feels effortless and light. The girls' lives move to the beat of disco rhythms, the chant of Double Dutch, and later the pleas of their boyfriends to do just this one thing...Their neighborhood is both lifeline and trap, and it's hard to say for sure why some break the tether and others become what they once scorned. --Seira Wilson, The Amazon Book Review

Great Decisions Group for 2018

Great Decisions will start new sessions in January. The Great Decisions series, sponsored by the Foreign Policy Association, empowers participants to discuss global issues shaping U.S. foreign policy and the world. The briefing book provides historical background, current U.S. policy and alternative policy options, informative maps and detailed graphs, suggested readings and resources, as well as opinion ballots for each topic. The 2018 topics will be The waning of Pax Americana; Russia's foreign policy; China and America: the new geopolitical equation; Media and foreign policy; Turkey: a partner in crisis; U.S. global engagement and the military; South Africa's fragile democracy; and Global health: progress and challenges.

We meet monthly from January - May and September - November. We are now taking orders for briefing books on the new topics for next year. The cost for books is estimated to be \$34 each if we order 10 or more books at one time. This includes shipping plus a pro rata share of the DVD that we watch at each session. If you would like to join the group order, please send a check for \$34 made payable to Jean F, or bring your check to the Dec. 2 holiday luncheon. I will order books soon after the luncheon. Books will be shipped to me in early January and delivered at the first meeting, unless you arrange to pick your copy up sooner.

You are welcome to share a book with another member to reduce the cost; in that case, we would appreciate a \$5.00 contribution from each of you toward the DVD.

The first session for 2018 is planned for Sunday, January 21, at 2:00 pm, at a location to be announced in the next newsletter.
