The American Association of University Women and Patrick Henry Library are co-sponsoring a presentation by Sister Simone Campbell, on February 10, 2018 at 10:00 AM at the Vienna Community Center. Sister Simone is a nationally recognized social justice activist and is the author of *A Nun on the Bus*. The focus is on economic justice, immigration issues, healthcare reform and voter turnout. The cover of the book states "How all of us can create hope, change, and community."

Sister Simone is a noted speaker and educator across the country on public policy issues. She is a driving force for programs that promote tolerance, equality, peace and justice. She has received numerous awards and been featured speaker at many large gatherings. She has appeared on "60 Minutes," "The Colbert Report", and "The Daily Show." As was written in the New York Times: "Who doesn't love a feisty nun?" In her spare time Sister Simone is a lawyer, writer and poet.

Redistricting Reform

Citizens Work on Redistricting Reform

Gerrymandering— the practice of drawing electoral district lines to benefit one political party—poses a serious problem for our democracy. In jurisdictions nationwide legislators have drawn maps that allow them to choose their voters rather than enabling voters to choose their representatives, a reversal that undermines the concept of fair representation. AAUW has long advocated for protecting voting rights as well

as <u>ensuring equitable</u> political <u>participation</u> and <u>representation</u>. But poorly drawn or purposefully unfair electoral district lines can threaten these ideals. With the 2020 census looming, there is a focus on electoral district boundaries. Many <u>citizen advocates</u> are taking matters into their own hands and drafting ballot proposals to reform redistricting in their states. Colorado, Michigan, Missouri, Ohio, Oregon, South Dakota, and Utah all have ballot initiatives underway. Additionally, members of <u>AAUW of Pennsylvania</u> and <u>AAUW of Virginia</u> are working to advance legislative solutions to this problem.

Human Trafficking

State Legislative Proposals to Curb Human Trafficking

A new toolkit from Shared Hope International provides rankings based on each state's human trafficking laws and offers policy solutions to strengthen existing legal frameworks. The guide focuses on six primary areas - criminalization of domestic minor sex trafficking, criminal provisions addressing demand, criminal provisions for traffickers, criminal provisions for facilitators, protective provisions for child victims, and criminal justice tools for investigation and prosecution. Tennessee earned the highest ranking. Coupled with the Polaris Project's model state legislation resource and the AAUW and National Council of Jewish Women Sex Trafficking Toolkit, advocates have many avenues to pursue in the fight to stop human trafficking.

Leslie notes: A new toolkit from Shared Hope International provides rankings based on each state's <u>human trafficking laws</u>. It shows that Virginia improved two grades, but unfortunately that means we went from an F to a C. More work to be done.

2018 NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Nominating Committee for 2018, comprised of Kate M, Nadine J and Connie D submits this report to the Vienna Area AAUW Branch of our slate of nominations for the following officer positions for terms from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2020.

Co-Presidents: Jean F. and Suzanne R.

Jean and Suzanne joined the Vienna Area Branch in 2004 and 1995, respectively. Each previously served at different times as Branch President. Secretary: Mary D

Mary joined the Branch in 2017, is active in the AAUW Lobby Corps, was a STEM volunteer in 2017, and is a member of Great Decisions.

The Branch membership will vote to fill the three fiscal year 2018-2020 officer positions at the Branch Annual Business Meeting to be held after the program on March 13, 2018 at the Patrick Henry Library. Under the Branch Bylaws: "Election shall be by a majority vote of the Individual Members present in person at the meeting and voting, a quorum of twenty (20) percent of the Individual Members eligible to vote being present. Proxy voting is not permitted."




NON-FICTION LITERATURE

Topic: "Russia's Foreign Policy"

(Topic 2)

Under President Vladimir Putin, Russia is projecting an autocratic model of governance abroad and working to undermine the influence of liberal democracies, namely along Russia's historical borderlands. Russia caused an international uproar in 2016, when it interfered in the U.S. presidential contest. But Putin's foreign policy toolkit includes other instruments, from alliances with autocrats to proxy wars with the U.S. in Georgia, Ukraine and Syria. How does Putin conceive of national interests, and why do Russian citizens support him? How should the United States respond to Putin's foreign policy ambitions? Nadine J. will lead the discussion and Cornelia N. will provide refreshments. Please let Mary know whether or not you plan to attend.

Based on 3 years of probing interviews, Pulitzer Prize winning Washington Post journalist Goldstein makes her literary debut with an engrossing investigation of Janesville, Wisconsin, where General Motors, the town's major employer, closed its plant in 2008. Goldstein reveals the shattering consequences of the plant's closing through the eyes of workers. educators, business and community leaders, and politicians – notably Paul Ryan, a Janesville native, who swept into town periodically. Janesville is a simultaneously enlightening and disturbing look at workingclass lives in America's heartland.


