Our branch board resolved at its July meeting that it is in the best interests of our members not to hold in-person

Voter suppression has been in the news lately, even before the pandemic greatly increased barriers. June saw a 40% decrease in the number of new voters registered statewide compared with June 2016, according to the Virginia Public Access Project.

One especially difficult obstacle is lack of an "acceptable" ID, a burden that especially affects older, poorer and less mobile citizens. In April Virginia greatly improved access to voting, but many other states maintain restrictions. people across the country obtain IDs so they can register and vote, as well as get jobs and housing.

Kat Calvin, the founder and Executive Director of Spread the Vote, will be our guest speaker in September. She will describe their work, their methodology, results, and how people can help.

Our guest speaker, Alicia Jones McLeod, is the Executive Director of **Challenging Racism.** This local organization started in 2004 as an effort to close the minority student achievement gap in Arlington Public Schools, offering training to inform faculty and staff about race and equity.

Since then, the organization has held yearlong workshops to teach people in Arlington about issues surrounding race. **Challenging Racism: Learning How**  began as a parallel experience to the Arlington Public Schools initiative. It has grown to provide information to school and work groups, community organizations, and others whose members can benefit from a deeper and broader understanding of racism and its effect on our society.

The 11 branches of AAUW of Virginia's Northern District are invited to this virtual program, which was organized by the AAUW Arlington (VA) Branch.

Due to the restrictions of the pandemic, the Vienna Area Branch will not conduct in-person voter registration this year. Instead we will focus on two other activities described below.

## Mail Personalized Letters

Sending a **Vote Forward** letter is one of the easiest things you can do to increase turnout. It takes two minutes and one stamp, and meaningfully increases the odds that the recipient will vote.

Requirements: printer, own stamps, envelopes. Number of letters is up to you, but we hope 15 each. Interested? Contact Kristin for details and to sign up. (If you don't have a printer, we can help with that.)

Vote Forward has partisan and non-partisan lists; to protect AAUW's 501(c)(3) status we will use the nonpartisan lists. In early October we will have a Zoom party to celebrate and to share what we have written.

# Progress Report on 2019-2021 Priorities

AAUW's **Public Policy Priorities**, adopted every two years by every-member vote, establish the federal action issues on which AAUW members across the country focus their advocacy efforts and guide the work of the national staff.

- To support a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity, diversity, and inclusivity, and to address the barriers and implicit biases that hinder the advancement of women and girls. AAUW advocates Title IX and STEM. <u>The STEM Act</u> was signed into law Dec. 24, 2019.
- To achieve economic security for all women, AAUW advocates: Pay equity, closing the gender gap, passing the FAMILY Act and the Paycheck Fairness Act, passed in the House.
- To guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice to a diverse and inclusive society, AAUW advocates: full access to civil and



constitutional rights, universal access to affordable health care, supporting the Voting Rights Advancement Act. The <u>House passed</u> <u>H.R. 4 to restore and expand voting access</u>. It has been renamed the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Act of 2020.

4. AAUW-VA Public Policy Co-chairs Susan Burk and Sylvia Rogers reported the <u>House Bill 622</u> <u>was signed into law in April</u> that "prohibits an employer from discharging or taking other retaliatory action against an employee who discloses or otherwise discusses their own wages or other compensation."

# Lobby Corps Receives Thanks for Voter Research Project



Because of COVID-19, AAUW Lobby Corps members were unable make in-person visits to Congress. Instead 18 members, including branch members Leslie Manning and Mary Dolson, contributed to AAUW's voter research project.

They completed research on 74 key races around the country. Currently, partial information is synthesized into AAUW's Federal Head-to-Head Voter Guide. Final copies will be posted eventually on the **AAUW Action Fund website** and sent to the states.

Robin Lucas, AAUW Advocacy Manager, said, "This is the first time we mobilized the lobby corps for such a project, and we are grateful for participants making it such a success."

#### Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion



It has been a pleasure to serve as chair of Diversity and Inclusion for the Vienna Area Branch. As a branch, we've worked together ensuring that our branch reflects those ideals in all aspects of our membership and programming. Now the scope has been broadened.

This summer the AAUW-VA Board approved changing the title and added the word "equity." Equity has always been the mission of AAUW. The word "equity" means to be fair and impartial. It is a befitting addition.

I invite you to visit the AAUW-VA website and examine the **Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion page.** You'll find resources on the topics of diversity, equity, and inclusion (DE&I). The website is updated regularly so I would encourage you to visit often!

During the Summer Leadership Meeting in July, the following DE&I experts were invited to speak and guide Zoom attendees' understanding of racism. Dr. Janice Underwood, who was appointed by Gov. Northam as the first cabinet-level Chief Diversity and Inclusion Officer, discussed the *One Virginia Strategic Plan for Inclusion Excellence*. Dr. Angela Hattery, Co-Director of the Center for the Study and Prevention of Gender-based Violence and Professor of Women and Gender Bias at the University of Delaware, and Dr. Earl Smith, Professor Emeritus of the American Ethnic Studies and Sociology at Wake Forest University, also spoke to attendees. Their talk was based on their book, *Policing Black Bodies*. They discussed how Black lives are surveilled and how to work for change. Both presentations were followed by many questions and comments from AAUW attendees.

Our branch continues to look for and create opportunities to collaborate and partner with other organizations in our community with like-minded goals and interests. This particular moment in the life of our nation offers us the chance to do just that!

Thanks for all you do personally and collectively to help our branch "bend the arc toward justice!"

## Potential AAUW Dues Increase (Copy of email sent to all branch presidents on August 17, 2020.)

Dear Laurie,

The AAUW Board of Directors will consider and vote on a change in Individual Member dues at their upcoming Board meeting on October 16, 2020. Any increase would take effect on July 1, 2021. The Board will consider two different options:

A. An increase to take effect on July 1, 2021, of an amount between \$3 and \$10.

B. An increase to take effect on the 1st of July of each of the next three fiscal years of between \$3 and \$10 each year.

The selection of option A or B and the exact amount of the increase for the option chosen will be determined by the board at its October meeting. Any change to Individual Member dues will impact paid Life Membership as well, since AAUW's bylaws require paid Life Membership to equal 20 years of annual dues. The Board is not considering a change to College/University Member dues at this time.

Membership dues cover between 15% and 20% of AAUW's annual budget. While AAUW's expenses increase annually, in recent years dues have not increased with enough regularity to keep pace with expenses. Increasing Individual Member dues will help AAUW cover more expenses, including important functions like the Connect team, critical technology and infrastructure such as the website and Member Services Database, and other member support.

Please send any comments regarding this dues increase to **connect@aauw.org** no later than Friday, September 25, 2020. All comments will be reviewed by AAUW staff and the Board of Directors prior to the Board's vote. Thank you.


