Social Justice in Policing

December 5: Artemis House Holiday Donations

Let us share the joy of the season in spirit and lots of telephone and Zoom gatherings. Although we cannot hold our annual Holiday Lunch as usual, we must continue our support for the residents of Artemis House.



For 30-plus years, our branch has supported Artemis House, a program of Shelter House, Inc. This non-profit organization is the only Fairfax County 24-hour emergency shelter for women and children fleeing domestic and sexual violence, stalking and human trafficking. As usual, the branch will collect donations of store gift cards and standard-size personal care

items for Artemis House residents. The cards and items are given to Artemis House families at holiday celebrations. The cards help them buy needed clothing, medicine, children's toys, groceries, pay for gasoline, and make long-distance calls to family, among other things. The personal care items are much treasured by residents. Donations are tax-deductible.


So light a candle, pour yourself a libation, and join us for an hour of socializing via Zoom. It won't be as cozy as a real hug, but we'd like to hear from you.

News from AAUW of Virginia: Public Policy & Equity

AAUW of Virginia Supports Amendment 1

AAUW of Virginia has long advocated that voting is a foundational right. However, in Virginia this right has been diminished because our Constitution allows the General Assembly and the Governor to redraw election districts every 10 years for both houses of the General Assembly and the U.S. House of Representatives. This has allowed elected officials to select their voters instead of allowing voters to select those representing them.






This Amendment is the result of a decade-long advocacy effort. It has passed in the Virginia legislature twice with bipartisan support. If Amendment 1 is approved by the voters on November 3, redistricting will be assigned to a citizen-chaired, bipartisan commission composed of eight citizens and


eight members of the General Assembly, with an equal number from each House and each major political party. A 3/4 vote of the commission's members will be required to approve district maps, thereby requiring substantial approval across party lines.

COVID-19 and Hispanics: Disproportionate Load

As reported in the AAUW of Virginia Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion website, Hispanics have borne the brunt of the COVID-19 pandemic in Virginia. While they make up 10 percent of the population, Hispanics

account for more than one-third of confirmed cases in which the race of persons tested were reported. The visual below from vpap.org illustrates the issue.





Hispanic: Individuals of any race who identify as "Hispanic or Latino"

Black: Non-Hispanics who identify as "Black or African American"

White: Non-Hispanics who identify as "White" alone

Asian or Pacific Islander: Non-Hispanics who identify as "Asian" or "Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander"




