From the Co-Presidents

I am woman, hear me roar
In numbers too big to ignore
And I know too much to go back an' pretend

"I Am Woman" was written by Helen Reddy and Ray Burton in 1971, over fifty years ago, but the song still resonates with women today. Let's take a brief look at only one important gender issue: the on-going wage gap between women and men.

An important part of women's history is the Equal Pay Act of 1963, which is almost fifty years old. This law amended the Fair Labor Standards Act and was aimed at abolishing wage disparity based on sex.

AAUW Chief Executive Officer Gloria L. Blackwell issued the following statement on September 13, 2022: "Women's economic security is under constant threat and, no matter how you measure it, the gender pay gap remains persistent and unacceptable. In a calculation of the latest data from the U.S. Census Bureau comparing full-time, year-round workers, women took home 83.7% of the pay that men did—a figure that is not statistically different from the pay gap in 2020. In addition, a more comprehensive calculation that compared everyone with earnings in 2021 (including part-time and seasonal workers) found that women were paid a shocking 77% of men's wages last year." The gap is even larger for working mothers and women of color. "AAUW found that Black women were compensated a mere 64% of what white, non-Hispanic men were paid in 2021. For Latinas, the gap was even more abysmal: 54%." Read more.

Midterm elections are rapidly approaching. It is important to remember that who you vote for will decide key issues for women. Election day is Tuesday, November 8.

You can join AAUW members from all over Virginia on January 19 to speak to our state representatives about AAUW legislative priorities. If you can go a day early, plan to attend the Women Legislators Reception the evening before, on January 18. Details will follow as they become available.

AAUW-VA Legislative & Policy Priorities 2022-2023

- Protect access to abortion and women's right to make personal reproductive decisions with their medical care providers.
- Eliminate systemic racism and sexism through changes to Virginia law and regulations.
- Make childcare affordable and readily available for all families.
- Protect full access to voting.
- Ensure full public-school funding and protect teachers from harassment and liability claims.

Donations to Artemis House

For over 30 years, our branch has annually supported residents of **Artemis House** (operated by Shelter House, Inc.) as our project to benefit women in need in our community and their children. With two locations, Artemis House is the only Fairfax County-sponsored, 24-hour emergency shelter for women and children fleeing domestic and sexual violence and human trafficking.

The branch collects donations of gift cards that are given to the residents so they can purchase medicine, groceries, clothing, and children's gifts as well as donations of lotions, shampoos and other personal care items. These donations mean so much to residents who generally arrive only with the clothes

they are wearing. Your donation is tax-deductible as a donation to Shelter House, Inc.

As Artemis House Chair, I will collect your donations. You can mail gift card donations to me or drop off any form of donation at my house by contacting me. Also, you can bring your donations to the branch programs on November 5 and December 3. Gift cards from grocery and drug stores, as well as multi-purpose stores like Walmart and Target, are most useful because of the many types of items they can be used to purchase.

Thank you to branch members for your decades of generous help to Artemis House women and children. This means so much to them!

AAUW of Virginia Named Honorees

In 2020 AAUW-VA created a special honor for those in Virginia whose actions have had a broad impact on furthering AAUW-VA's mission and priorities and who provided exceptional service to the state. Last year four outstanding recipients were selected as honorees and were recognized at the 2022 state conference.

Now it is time for nominations for the 2023 award, and AAUW-VA would like your help! The award is similar to having branches honor individuals and organizations in their branches and communities. The difference is that this award honors those who have made exceptional contributions *statewide*.

Here are criteria that the Named Honoree Committee* will consider:

 Nominees may be members of AAUW-VA whose actions have had statewide impact.

- Nominees may also be non-members as well as organizations that have provided exceptional service to the state.
- Nominees cannot be a state board member or person seeking elective political office in the year the award is presented.

Detailed information must be presented with a nomination. You are welcome to update and re-submit nominations from 2021.

Nominations may be submitted **online.** Deadline for submissions is November 15, 2022.

The named honoree committee will review all nominations. The AAUW-VA executive board will approve the honoree(s) at its January, 2023, board meeting. If you have any questions, please contact Ann Johnson.



Next meeting will be January 25, 2023, to discuss *Horse* by Geraldine Brooks.



6. Global Famine 2. War Crimes


3. China and the U.S. 7. Iran at a Crossroads 4. Economic Warfare
