Before Virginia's 2023 legislative session convenes on January 11, get a preview on January 4 from area State of Herndon. They will discuss legislation and issues Senators Chap Petersen (Dist. 34) and Jennifer Boysko (Dist. 33). The program will be held via Zoom and hosted by the Patrick Henry Library and the Vienna Area and Reston-Herndon Area AAUW Branches. Preregistration for the Zoom meeting is required.

Senator Petersen represents the City of Fairfax and part of Fairfax County, including the Town of Vienna,

and Senator Boysko represents Reston and the Town they anticipate arising in the upcoming session, especially those relating to AAUW's legislative interests: gender equity for women and girls in education, employment, and opportunity. There will be time for questions.

Meg and Krysta reviewed the definitions of diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging and then strategized on ways the branch could integrate DEIB in its work. Next, attendees broke into groups to discuss how to attract more diversity in our membership.

The presentation concluded when Meg and Krysta listed some of these ideas. They included the following actions that branch members could take:

• Learn about the Fairfax County "**One Fairfax**" policy, adopted in 2017, which requires that the Board of Supervisors and School Board consider equity in the development of future policies, programs, and services.

- Review DEI resources listed at https://aauwva.aauw.net/diversity-inclusion-equity/.
- Enter into collaborations with more diverse organizations to hold joint programs.
- Arrange and promote programs that will attract diverse members of the community.
- Seek to address the general difficulty of attracting younger people to attend our events and to become members given the dynamics of their work and family responsibilities.
- Continue to hold some programs via Zoom to increase the reach of and attendance at branch programs. In connection with this, assist members who find the Zoom technology daunting.


Nonfiction Book Group
