#### From the Co-Presidents

Since joining AAUW many years ago, it has come to my attention that many individuals could become more involved at the community, state, and national levels. However, most of us are just too busy with our own lives. I recently attended a meeting that listed a number of ways to become "a two-minute activist." The following list, compliments of AAUW, reminds us of the many opportunities we have to make our voices heard:

- 1. Eliminate systemic racism and sexism through changes to Virginia law and regulations.
- 2. Communicate with local, state and federal representatives and officials.
- 3. Stay alert for opportunities to engage on specific issues.
- 4. Ensure full public school funding and protect teachers from harassment and liability claims.
- 5. Write about important issues and send these articles to the newspapers.
- 6. Make childcare affordable and readily available for all families.
- 7. Stay alert for activities that AAUW-VA identifies, e.g., **Reclaim our Vote**.
- 8. Engage with local advocates and organizations, e.g., Virginia Organizing.
- 9. Stay informed by signing up for AAUW's Two-Minute Activist.
- 10. Attend the Virginia AAUW State Conference; see page 3 for details.
- 11. Finally, become more involved in your local branch. Ask what you can do to help.

I retired after thirty-five years of teaching at the secondary, community college, and university levels. Some of the valuable lessons I learned by interacting with students were to find out what motivates them, to discover connections, and to personalize experiences -- i.e., let students tell their stories. These same educational strategies can be used by AAUW members to advance gender equity in our community. Try just one or two of these eleven options and you will be justly rewarded!

#### **Recent Public Policy Events**

#### January 4: Branch Program with Local Virginia State Senators

On January 4, State Senators Jennifer Boysko and Chap Petersen spoke to us on Zoom about the upcoming Virginia legislative session. The senators addressed topics of special concern, both AAUW priorities and bills they plan to introduce.

## January 19: Lobby Day in Richmond

We thank for representing our branch on January 19 in Richmond to lobby the General Assembly on AAUW priorities. The twenty-five AAUW-VA advocates who attended were organized in teams of two to visit offices of eighty delegates and senators. In most cases they met with legislative aides and delivered briefing packets for the following AAUW priorities and related upcoming legislation:

- Salary history ban
- Workplace harassment
- · Paid family and medical leave

- Education vouchers and tuition tax credits
- Reproductive rights.

Moving on to the Capitol, AAUW advocates split between attending the Senate or House session. They were introduced on the record in the first hour of each session and then applauded by the legislators.

Lobby Day was organized by Janine Greenwood and Denise Murden, AAUW-VA Co-Vice Presidents for Public Policy.


## **Brown Bag Books**

A beautiful, big-hearted story of strangers brought together by love, war, art, flood, and the ghost of E. M. Forster.




#### **Economic Warfare**
