Branch Members Lobby the Virginia General Assembly

Three branch members, Suzanne Rothwell, Kristin Moyer, and I, went to Richmond on January 31 where we joined forces with 31 other AAUW members from around the state to lobby our State Senators and Delegates. Our Virginia AAUW public policy chairs, Janine Greenwood and Denise Murden, briefed us at the newly-built General Assembly Office Building and gave us materials to hand out. Then we met with representatives to tell them about AAUW and we brought AAUW priorities to their attention: • Advocating for abortion rights and for a reproductive rights Virginia Constitutional amendment

- Advocating for economic security and equity for women in the workplace
- Making childcare affordable and readily available for all families
- Ensuring full public-school funding and a strong system of public education that promotes equity, diversity, and inclusivity
- Protecting full access to voting through a Virginia Constitutional amendment

Kristin summed up our experience nicely, saying "I thought the lobby day was particularly well organized and productive this year and am so glad I could attend!"
