#### IN CASE YOU MISSED OUR OCTOBER PROGRAM

#### Meghan Kissell, AAUW Headquarters, Speaks at Oct. 9 Program

Advocacy is at the heart of the AAUW's mission and Meghan Kissell, Senior Director of Policy and Member Advocacy at AAUW's Washington headquarters, has primary responsibility for our advocacy efforts. She leads that work at the Federal level and supports the advocacy work of AAUW's nationwide membership network.

Meghan "peeled back the curtain" on her office's activities. With her staff of three (including interns), her office manages to cover issues that require a short-term, quick response and longer term issues that are part of AAUW's mission. Their efforts are assisted by weekly coalition calls in which they exchange information with other organizations on developments and challenges in higher education and other topics. The office focuses on women's education, women's employment, and efforts to assure a thriving AAUW, which are AAUW strategic issues.

Some of Meghan's guidelines in selecting policy issues on which to focus on include:

- We're not effective when we swing at everything we need to carefully choose the issues we work on.
- We try to build momentum in issues we care deeply about, even if legislation may not
  pass in this Congress. Rarely does a bill get passed in one session, and we need to remind lawmakers of our interest on an ongoing basis.
- We are in regular contact with state public policy chairs to identify issues and challenges we should take on. Diane Schrier is the Virginia chair.

Meghan described upcoming efforts to create better connections between AAUW National and the branches. A survey of branches showed that branches want more practical information on advocacy, including policy briefings and meetings with other partner organizations. As a result, AAUW National will be focusing on providing training on working with coalitions, how to collaborate, and how to work with school boards.

She also urged us to sign up and participate in the <u>ACTION Network</u>. This involves receiving emails and using the Two-Minute Activist software to send emails to our members of Congress. She suggested that it makes your communication more effective if you slightly edit the text that is provided, because congressional offices are looking for nuances and differences in responses. She also suggested calling congressional offices to express your opinions. She mentioned that if you want to find out more about Lobby Corps, you can participate in a session without obligation. Meghan concluded her presentation by reminding us that the power of AAUW is its passion about issues and the actions of its membership
